Our Benefactors

Margaret Eleyce Ard Usery '72 and husband Melvin

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin and Lisa Usery are the benefactors for the Usery Forum on Leadership.

Mrs. Margaret Eleyce Ard ("Lisa") Usery taught mathematics for twenty-six years and retired from full-time teaching in 2002. She taught both in the middle and high school levels, principally algebra and also geometry and pre-calculus. She holds a Bachelor of Science degree, which she received from Georgia College in 1972. She is a member of the Advisory Board for the John H. Lounsbury College of Education. Along with her husband, Mrs. Usery serves as principals of the Kim Usery Foundation, Inc., a non-profit named for their late daughter, Kimberly.

Mr. Melvin Usery retired with thirty years of service from United Parcel Service, having held domestic assignments in Georgia—Macon, Atlanta, and Savannah—and in Jacksonville, Florida. He also worked internationally with UPS's Canadian operation, UPS Canada Ltd., with assignments in Edmonton, Alberta, and Toronto, Ontario. Shortly after retirement, he was elected to public office and served four years on Florida's Ocean Highway Port Authority with one year as chairman. Mr. Usery is a Rotarian and Farm Bureau Member and has held numerous volunteer and civic positions. He is managing director of family-owned A&U Ranch, LLC, a timber operation and ground transportation consulting business.

15th U.S. Secretary of Labor

The Usery Forum on Leadership is named for W. J. Usery, Jr. (1923 – 2016), fifteenth United States Secretary of Labor.

Usery served in the cabinet of President Gerald R. Ford, leading the U.S. Department of Labor in 1976 and 1977. A distinguished negotiator with an international reputation for overcoming impasses and creating mutual benefit, Usery mediated some of the most difficult disputes of the twentieth century.

Seen as a formidable but fair negotiator, Usery commanded broad respect in Washington and across the private sector. He received five presidential appointments to national service, from both Republican and Democratic administrations.

Georgia College's Ina Dillard Russell Library features the W. J. Usery, Jr. Leadership Gallery. Secretary Usery's collection at Georgia College's Special Collections spans his career as a public servant and his time in private practice.


- Brings people together, bridging divides and spanning boundaries,

Jane Kim Coloseus is a gender equality specialist who works in traditionally maledominated industries, including the nuclear sector, national security, and politics.

Coloseus is the Executive Director for Her Term, a Georgia-based initiative created to recruit progressive women to run for public office in the Georgia state legislature. She is also the principal of Emzo Consulting LLC, where she works with small businesses and international organizations on diversity and inclusion, women's leadership, and empowerment. Coloseus serves on the Global Communication Committee for Women in Nuclear Global, a professional organization and global network for women working in the nuclear sector. She is also actively involved with Women of Color Advancing Peace and Security and voluntarily supports projects including UN engagement and special programs.

Previously, Coloseus was on loan to the International Atomic Energy Agency by the United States government as a gender equality specialist. In that role, she increased the representation of women through dedicated outreach and talent management initiatives, profiled multiple women in the industry to promote women's work, led internal policy adaptations, and developed workforce balance tracking mechanisms to earn the recognition of a top-performing technical UN organization on gender equality.

Coloseus holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in anthropology and history from the University of Virginia and MSc in government analytics from the Johns Hopkins University.

Rae André is a sustainability educator and environmental activist who focuses on working with climate leaders. She promotes sustainability leadership based on the principles that growth is finite, natural capital is priceless, and human progress must be measured in terms of both economics and the quality of life.

An organizational psychologist, André is Professor Emeritus of Leadership and Sustainability and Instructor in the D'Amore-McKim School of Business at Northeastern University in Boston. Her courses promote systemic thinking on climate change and energy evolution. Aimed at high level undergraduates, MBAs, and professionals, they include sustainability for organizations ("weak" sustainability) along with sustainability for the planet ("strong" sustainability). Her work has reached students in a variety of disciplines from management to engineering to the liberal arts.

André received a Ph.D. in organizational psychology from the University of Michigan, a Master of Arts degree in film studies from the University of California at Los Angeles, and a Bachelor of Arts degree (cum laude) in English from Cornell University.

Rita McGinley Endowed Executive Director Fred Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media

Assistant Professor of Child and Family Studies, St. Vincent College

Dr. Dana Winters is the Rita McGinley Executive Director of the Fred Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media at Saint Vincent College. Her extensive field research—from interviewing prisoners to shadowing crossing guards, from observing Head Start teachers to developing coaches in early childhood systems—has informed the co-development of the Simple Interactions approach to support children, families, and their helpers.

Dr. Winters describes and affirms the essential and relational practices of professionals across early education and intervention, out-of-school-time learning, healthcare, family engagement, and more. She is an experienced applied researcher who has served as co-principal

investigator and program evaluator for consecutive National Science Foundation-funded early childhood research and intervention projects in the areas of early literacy, socialemotional development, and early mathematical learning. She leads numerous foundation and government project grants to improve early childhood systems and family engagement practices. Dr. Winters serves as a UNESCO Faculty Fellow in Children and Youth Studies, collaborating with faculty around the world in the advancement of empathy development and adult-child relationships across developmental settings. She received a Ph.D. in administrative and policy studies from the University of Pittsburgh.
