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Sarawak - A geographic overview



Sarawak, situated on the island of Borneo in Southeast Asia, stands as one of Malaysia's 13 states and is celebrated for its cultural diversity, abundant biodiversity, and stunning landscapes.

Sarawak is the largest state in Malaysia. Its colourful history, vibrant culture and traditions, spectacular natural beauty and fascinating wildlife make the state a captivating land of adventure. Huge rainforests provide a suitable habitat for countless jungle animals and rare plant species. Of the 550 bird species, the hornbill is best known as the heraldic animal of Sarawak. Among other things, the hornbill can be admired in Bako National Park. The rainforest is about an hour drive from the capital Kuching and a true paradise for nature lovers and adventurers. Beautiful Gunung Mulu National Park (UNESCO World Heritage Site) is home to one of the largest cave systems in the world, the largest cave passage in the world and one of the largest subterranean chambers in the world. In the caves of the Niah National Park, in addition to 1,200-year-old rock drawings, a human skull was found during archaeological excavations, the age of which could be dated at 39,000 to 45,000 years.

Culturally, Sarawak is also very interesting: Many indigenous groups, who mostly live and work as farmers or fishermen in the coastal regions, are at home in Sarawak. The Iban form the largest population group in the state. Traditionally, they live in longhouses that house the entire village community. Such longhouses as well as



handicrafts, dance and music performances of different tribes can be admired at Sarawak Cultural Village.

As the capital of Sarawak, Kuching is a city rich in history, character, and warmth. Home to approximately 680,000 people, the city exudes a quiet pride — not through grand displays, but in the everyday charm of its streets, waterfronts, and friendly locals. Visitors are welcomed with genuine hospitality and encouraged to explore the city as it truly is: relaxed, authentic, and full of surprises.

To truly experience Kuching, step beyond the confines of a tour bus. Wander its vibrant streets, cycle through heritage neighbourhoods, or hop on a traditional sampan along the Sarawak River. The best way to connect with this remarkable city is to get out, explore, and be part of its everyday rhythm.

Sarawak has a highly diverse population, encompassing numerous races and 27 ethnic groups, with over 40 sub-ethnic groups, each with its own unique language, culture, and way of life. The major ethnic groups of Sarawak are: Iban, Chinese, Malay, Bidayuh, Orang Ulu, Melanau

Language

Bahasa Malaysia (Malay) is the national language. However, the Sarawak Malays speak a dialect that would be incomprehensible to most other Malays from the rest of the country. Due to the colonial past, however, the English language plays a special role. It serves as the language of business and is the second language for most Malaysians.

Religion

While Islam holds the status of Malaysia's official religion, Sarawak, renowned for its ethnic diversity, stands as a notably tolerant region. Within its borders, one can find adherents of various faiths, including Muslims, Christians, Buddhists, Taoists, and Hindus. Prior to the introduction of other religions, animism played a significant role in shaping Dayak culture; however, it now represents only a minority belief system. The dominant religion in Sarawak is Christianity (42% divided between Catholics, Protestants, Methodists, Evangelists and Baptists).

Politics

Malaysia (including Sarawak) has a parliamentary democracy and a constitutional monarchy. The head of government is the prime minister. The country has a bicameral legislative system.

Climate

Sarawak experiences an equatorial climate characterized by relatively consistent temperatures throughout the year, typically ranging from 23°C in the early morning to 32°C during the day. In the highland regions like Bario, daytime temperatures hover between 16°C and 25°C, occasionally dropping to as low as 11°C at night. The northeast monsoon, which typically occurs from November to February, brings heavy rainfall, while the southwest monsoon from June to October is generally milder. Annual rainfall levels vary between 3,300 millimetres and 4,600 millimetres, depending on the specific location. Humidity



remains consistently high in the lowlands, ranging from 80 percent to 90 percent.

Currency

The currency unit is the Malaysian ringgit - abbreviated RM or MYR. One ringgit is currently (as of February 2023) worth about 0.21 euros (1 euro = about 4.64 ringgit). The ringgit is freely convertible and may be imported or exported - just like any other currency - up to a maxi- mum of 10,000 USD.

Cash can be exchanged at all commercial banks, in large hotels and at registered money changers. The latter can be found almost everywhere in the country, are usually open longer and usually offer more favourable exchange rates than banks and hotels.

Time zone

Central European Time + 7 hours (Central European Summer Time + 6 hours)

Telecommunication

Malaysia's international dialling code is +60. Usually, hotels and resort in the country provide WIFI.

Entry regulations

To enter the country, EU citizens only need a passport, which is valid until six months after the end of the planned stay. Visa-free travellers can stay in Malaysia for up to three months. Visas for longer stays are available from state immigration offices. Passport and customs checks are also usually carried out for domestic travel between West and East Malaysia.

Vaccination requirements

Vaccinations are not required for entry into Malaysia and are only necessary if the traveller comes from an infectious area. Malaria prophylaxis is usually not required, as the coastal areas of the Malaysian peninsula and the offshore islands are malaria-free. It is only recommended for longer stays in one of the deep jungle areas in Sabah on Borneo.

Travel

The primary gateway to Sarawak is Kuching, located approximately 1 hour and 30 minutes away from Kuala Lumpur and Kota Kinabalu. Kuching is also conveniently accessible through direct international flights from various destinations, including Indonesia (Pontianak, Bali, and Jakarta), Bandar Seri



Begawan in Brunei, Macau, and Singapore, with several weekly flights available. Over 40 international airlines fly to Malaysia, while the national carrier, Malaysia Airlines, has a global network spanning six continents. The main point of entry to Malaysia by sea is Port Klang, about 50 kilometres from Kuala Lumpur. Malaysia is also accessible by rail and road from Singapore and Thailand.

Transportation

Malaysia has excellent domestic air connections served by Malaysia Airlines as well as airlines such as AirAsia and Firefly. The well-developed and efficient public transport system is served by buses, cabs and trains.

Accommodations

Malaysia features a wide range of accommodations, including inter- national star hotels, boutique hotels, beach resorts, chalets, youth hostels and timeshare apartments.

Heritage Sites

UNESCO World Sarawak is home to World Heritage Site, Gunung Mulu National Park. It is renowned for its breathtaking mountain peaks and caverns, among them the expansive Deer Cave. home to a vast population of bats. This cave eventually opens up to reveal the Garden of Eden, a secluded valley with a stunning waterfall, surrounded by towering limestone cliffs.

Building momentum toward its international debut, *Serumpun Sarawak* is set to headline two major showcases: **Osaka, Japan** and **Mulu, Sarawak**. These global stages will

Hosted by the Ministry of Tourism, Creative Industry and Performing Arts Sarawak (MTCP) and the Sarawak Tourism Board (STB), *Serumpun Sarawak* marks a bold new chapter for the state's tourism and cultural economy. The initiative is led by world-renowned chef and indigenous gastronomy advocate, Chef James Won, in collaboration with Atlas Collective.

More than a gastronomic experience, *Serumpun Sarawak* is a global invitation to engage with Sarawak as a living ecosystem of biodiversity, creativity, and ancestral knowledge, where indigenous wisdom meets contemporary innovation, and where food becomes a vessel for storytelling, identity, and connection.

"When Kuching earned its designation as a UNESCO Creative City of Gastronomy, it wasn't simply a feather in our cap, it was a call to action. A signal to the world that Sarawak's culinary roots run deep — and our ambitions reach far," said YB Dato' Sri Abdul Karim Rahman Hamzah, Minister for Tourism, Creative Industry and Performing Arts Sarawak. "Serumpun Sarawak is our answer to that call. It is where ancestral knowledge meets cutting-edge creativity. Where native ingredients become narrative. Where stories from the lands are translated into unforgettable multisensory experiences."

The journey's first confirmed activation took place from 5th to 8th August 2025 in Osaka, Japan, as part of an exclusive cultural gastronomy showcase in conjunction with the *World Expo 2025*. Hosted at Seaside Studio Caso, this immersive event will introduce Japanese and global audiences to the depth and diversity of Sarawak's indigenous cuisines, ingredients, and creative expressions. Through curated dining experiences, visual storytelling, and cultural showcases, Osaka will offer a window into Sarawak's soul, a vibrant confluence of land, people, and culinary heritage.

Following its international debut, *Serumpun Sarawak* will return to its roots with a powerful community-based activation deep in Sarawak's own natural crown jewel, the **UNESCO World Heritage-listed Mulu National Park**. **In October 2025**, the journey will host a site-specific experience within the park itself, blending indigenous culinary traditions, ecological appreciation, and cultural storytelling in one of the world's most awe-inspiring environments. The Mulu activation reflects *Serumpun Sarawak's* commitment to ensuring that global recognition is always grounded in respect for local communities, biodiversity, and indigenous knowledge systems.

Collaboration sits at the heart of *Serumpun Sarawak*, with leading Sarawakian organisations such as *Earthlings Coffee Workshop*, *Tanoti Crafts*, *The Tuyang Initiative*, and the *Culinary Heritage & Arts Society Sarawak (CHASS)* working together to champion indigenous ingredients, craftsmanship, and cultural preservation. Their shared vision ensures that the journey remains rooted in authenticity, empowering local communities while amplifying Sarawak's position as a world-class destination for cultural and culinary exploration.

Guests at the launch press conference were offered an early taste of what lies ahead, with a captivating ethnic cooking showcase and an exclusive preview of The



Serumpun Story, a short film encapsulating the essence of the journey. A curated coffee experience by Earthlings Coffee Workshop also highlighted Sarawak's emerging status as a terroir for exceptional coffee cultivation, blending tradition, sustainability, and global potential.

Serumpun Sarawak represents the next evolution of Sarawak's tourism and cultural landscape, where heritage is not frozen in time but continually reimagined, shared, and celebrated. It is an invitation to the world to experience Sarawak not just through its landscapes but through its flavours, its stories, and its people. Sarawak is committed to enhancing its community-based tourism offerings by expanding the availability of homestays and eco-host accommodations. These initiatives enable travellers to fully immerse themselves in local cultures while actively contributing to sustainable tourism practices. By fostering meaningful connections between visitors and local communities, Sarawak not only promotes environmental stewardship but also supports the economic well-being of its residents.

Developments

Sarawak, Malaysia, is experiencing significant developments across various sectors. These developments reflect Sarawak's commitment to infrastructure enhancement, energy sector growth, and effective disaster management, contributing to its overall progress and resilience.

Infrastructure Projects:

The state has announced plans to invest RM100 billion over the next five to ten years in two major infrastructure projects: a new international airport and a deep-sea port in Kuching. These initiatives aim to transform Sarawak into a regional aviation and marine hub, enhancing its appeal to corporations, investors, and tourists.

Kuching Urban Transportation System (KUTS):

As a crucial part of Sarawak's Green Hydrogen Agenda, Sarawak is on the verge of implementing its Kuching Urban Transportation System (KUTS) project. This initiative involves the introduction of zero-emission vehicles with the primary goal of alleviating traffic congestion in the broader Kuching city area. It is a pivotal step in the Sarawak government's commitment to decarbonize public transportation and promote the growth of the hydrogen economy.

Currently, visitors to Kuching have the opportunity to explore the city aboard eco-friendly buses powered entirely by hydrogen. These buses not only contribute to a cleaner environment but also offer passengers additional benefits such as complimentary Wi-Fi access, LED displays, and real-time GPS tracking of the bus route through the H2 Bus App. Another significant advancement in modernizing Sarawak's public transport system involves the utilization of the Autonomous Rapid Transit (ART) as the primary vehicle, supported by a feeder bus network. The phased implementation of the KUTS project, overseen by Sarawak Metro, is scheduled to commence in 2025.

PAN Borneo Highway Sarawak:

The completion of the PAN Borneo Highway Sarawak marks a significant turning point for the region's tourism sector, poised to propel Sarawak into a thriving and highly desired tourist hub. As it reaches full completion, this initiative is set to act as a catalyst, ushering in a new era for Sarawak's tourism industry.

The improved road infrastructure and enhanced connectivity will significantly simplify tourists' access to remote corners of Sarawak. This heightened accessibility unlocks a treasure trove of fresh tourist attractions, including hidden gems that were previously challenging to reach. It offers travellers a



gateway to delve deeper into the state's authentic cultural heritage, breathtaking natural landscapes, and diverse wildlife.

Energy Sector:

A recent agreement between Malaysia's state energy company, Petronas, and the Sarawak government grants the state greater control over local gas distribution. While this deal is expected to reduce Petronas' earnings by up to 11%, it underscores Sarawak's efforts to gain more authority over its resources.

Additionally, Petronas plans to "rightsize" its workforce to ensure long-term sustainability amid global operational challenges. This move is not related to the recent gas distribution agreement with Sarawak.

Renewable Energy Initiatives:

Sarawak is advancing in renewable energy projects, including the H2biscus Project in collaboration with international partners. This initiative focuses on producing green hydrogen and green ammonia, positioning the state as a leader in clean energy production.

Flood Management:

The state has been addressing challenges posed by recent floods. As of February 7, 2025, the number of flood evacuees in Sarawak decreased to 4,389, indicating progress in flood management and relief efforts.

Sarawak Delta Geopark Becomes Malaysia's Sixth National Geopark:

In June 2023, the Sarawak Delta Geopark (SDG) achieved the esteemed status of being Malaysia's sixth national geopark, as part of the National Geopark Development Programme. Encompassing an extensive 3,122 square kilometres, this geopark is situated in the southern region of Sarawak. It stands out for its distinctive geological formations, featuring 28 remarkable geosites, rich biological diversity across 12 biosites, and a vibrant cultural heritage represented by 14 cultural sites.

This recognition serves as a testament to the dedicated efforts put forth by the Sarawak government and local authorities. Their commitment to preserving nature and responsibly managing areas of significant national value underscores their dedication to enhancing the socio-economic well-being of the local communities residing within and around the National Geopark. This positive impact is achieved through their active involvement in various activities and geopark development programmes.

Geopark visitors can witness exceptional and captivating geological and historical formations, spanning from carbon to resin. Moreover, they can explore the remarkable biodiversity featuring endemic species found in Borneo, such as orangutans, proboscis monkeys, and the enchanting fairy rock gecko. Beyond nature, the geopark also showcases Sarawak's diverse and culturally rich heritage through its architecture, musical instruments, cuisine, and numerous other facets.

Explore the Deep Dark of Mulu:

Few places in Sarawak, Malaysian Borneo, can match the magnificence of Gunung Mulu National Park. This tropical rainforest locale, approximately 100 kilometres from Miri, is a world of wonder, boasting some of the largest, longest, and most fascinating cave systems on the planet. It meets all criteria needed for UNESCO's World Heritage Site status, including earth's history, geological features, ecological processes, superlative natural phenomena, and biodiversity.

On the surface, the park showcases a 544 square kilometre expanse, named after Gunung Mulu, with a mountainous landscape that leaves visitors awestruck. But as you venture deeper, you'll uncover sights few have ever seen before. Roaring waterfalls, winding rivers, dense canopies, and captivating wildlife await, making this a true escape from civilization.



Cave Exploration in Mulu National Park:

Underneath the surface lies a completely different world. The Mulu mountains house some of the world's most impressive subterranean systems, shaped over millions of years. Here's a glimpse of our recent exploration of a fraction of these caves, hosted by Sarawak Tourism Board (STB) in partnership with MASwings and Mulu Marriott Resort & Spa.

Journey into the Deep:

A 30-minute boat ride from Mulu Marriott took us to the starting point of our adventure into the Cave of the Winds, the first of two show caves we explored. As we ascended winding limestone steps, we marvelled at the lush surrounding jungle, gradually making our way to the cave's entrance.

Torchlights in hand, we ventured along a wooden path leading deeper into the Cave of the Winds. As we moved through the cave, the subterranean world revealed itself—stalactites hung from the ceiling, stalagmites emerged from the guano-covered ground, and some formed columns, notably at the King's Chamber.

Moving through the dark passages, we observed evidence of the cave's formation by a now-vanished subterranean river. What remained was an underground landscape of unparalleled fascination.

Art by Water:

Each of Mulu's caves is unique. Clearwater Cave, with a length of over 200 kilometres, features a clear river that has created "works of art" over millions of years. To reach the mouth of Clearwater Cave, we climbed 200 steps, a challenge that proved easier than expected.

Inside the cave, its massive size became apparent. The river had carved intricate patterns into the limestone rocks, showcasing nature's artistry. Standing on a bridge over the flowing river within the cave passage was a breath-taking experience, capturing the beauty within the dark hollows of Clearwater Cave.

Experience Mulu:

Now that travel is possible again, we highly recommend a trip to Mulu to explore its amazing caves and climbs. Mulu Airport is accessible via MASwings flights from Miri, Kuching, or Kota Kinabalu. For luxury and nature lovers, Mulu Marriott Resort & Spa offers an ideal stay amid a pristine tropical jungle.



Sarawak's gastronomy is a diverse, flavourful journey through a melting pot of cultures and ingredients, making it a must-visit destination for food lovers.

Sarawak's national dish, "Sarawak Laksa," is a culinary masterpiece that embodies the state's rich and diverse food culture. This aromatic and spicy noodle soup is renowned for its tantalizing combination of flavours, featuring a creamy and fragrant coconut-based broth infused with a symphony of local spices, lemongrass, and chili paste. What makes Sarawak Laksa truly exceptional is the generous use of fresh seafood, including prawns, fish, and sometimes even squid, reflecting the state's coastal location. Served with a mound of vermicelli rice noodles and garnished with ingredients like bean sprouts, shredded chicken, and lime, this dish is an explosion of taste sensations in every mouthful. It's a must-try for any food lover visiting Sarawak, offering a delightful journey into the heart of the state's culinary heritage.

Hawker Stalls - When it comes to savouring the finest in local cuisine, the go-to spots are the hawker stalls found at coffee shops and food centres, each boasting its own unique signature dishes. These culinary gems offer budget-friendly prices while ensuring that the ingredients are consistently freshly prepared. For those planning to visit during breakfast or lunch hours, arriving early is advisable to secure your pick before they run out.

Festive Dining - Sarawak's vibrant food culture comes alive during religious and ethnic festivals, where our cherished "open house" tradition invites you to partake in the culinary treasures of our land. Venture to an Iban longhouse during Gawai Dayak, where you can relish the exquisite flavours of jungle delicacies paired with tuak, a traditional rice wine. Pay a visit to a Malay kampung during Hari Raya, where rendang (a spicy dry curry) and Sarawak kek lapis (Sarawak layer cakes) await your taste buds. Or indulge in the rich and sweet notes of mooncakes during the Chinese mid-autumn festival, offering a delightful glimpse into our diverse culinary heritage.

Nature Experiences

Gunong Mulu National Park

Gunong Mulu National Park, the largest in Sarawak, is Malaysia's first UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2000, known for its vast limestone caves, including the world's largest chamber and Southeast Asia's longest cave. Visitors can explore four captivating show caves, a bat observatory, a rainforest canopy walk and embark on



adventurous caving experiences. For the ultimate adventure, there's the challenging Pinnacles climb and the historic Headhunter's Trail through pristine rainforests.

At the Geopark, you'll encounter fascinating geological formations, unique biodiversity including orangutans and proboscis monkeys, and an array of cultural elements that represent Sarawak's rich heritage, from architecture to culinary traditions.

Bako National Park

Despite being one of Sarawak's smallest parks, Bako National Park stands out as one of the most captivating and diverse due to its seven distinct plant ecosystems, all packed into an area smaller than Manhattan Island. While Bako is renowned for its iconic primate species, including the unique Proboscis Monkey exclusive to Borneo, and the endearing Silvery Langur, it offers much more to visitors. The park boasts 17 well-maintained trails that allow visitors to explore nearly all the different vegetation types found in Borneo. Among the commonly sighted wildlife species are the Proboscis Monkey, Silvery Langur, Bornean Bearded Pigs, Long-tailed Macaques, Colugos or Flying Lemurs, White-bellied Sea Eagles, and a host of others. Remarkably, wildlife encounters are almost guaranteed, and all of this natural wonder is less than an hour away from Kuching, including a delightful longboat ride across the bay.

Niah National Park

Niah National Park, located in Miri and spanning 139 hectares, is celebrated for its rich biodiversity, archaeological significance, and breathtaking limestone formations. It is most renowned for the ancient skeletal remains found in the Niah Caves, dating back an astounding 65,000 years, marking the oldest recorded human settlement in Southeast Asia.

Niah's Great Cave is a mesmerizing chamber adorned with striking stalactites and stalagmites and serves as a habitat for millions of swiftlets, whose nests are highly sought after for their culinary and medicinal value. The Painted Cave, on the other hand, boasts prehistoric wall paintings that offer a glimpse into the lives of ancient inhabitants dating back thousands of years. With its captivating caves, vibrant rainforests, and insights into ancient civilizations, Niah National Park is a must-visit, especially for archaeology enthusiasts worldwide.

In early October 2023, an assessment team from the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) conducted a comprehensive five-day evaluation to determine Niah National Park's eligibility for UNESCO World Heritage Site status. The findings will be presented to the World Heritage Committee for review and a final decision, which will be announced at a later date.

Caving in Southwest Sarawak



The rugged landscape of Southwest Sarawak hides a subterranean wonderland of magnificent limestone caves, which receive significantly fewer visitors compared to those in Niah and Mulu National Parks. Beyond the breathtaking rock formations, these caves also reveal ancient cave paintings and offer stunning jungle vistas throughout the journey. Many of these caves are well-suited for beginners and do not demand a high level of physical fitness. There's a variety of options available, ranging from single-day caving expeditions to more extended journeys that incorporate caving, rock climbing, 4x4 excursions, forest hikes, and visits to remote Bidayuh villages. Activities cater to individuals at beginner, intermediate, and advanced levels, and all necessary equipment and protective attire are provided.

Birding in Sarawak

Sarawak is a haven for bird enthusiasts, boasting 22 Important Bird Areas, where you can find more than 600 of the 680-plus bird species recorded in Borneo, including a remarkable 50 endemic species. Whether you're looking for a casual half-day birding adventure to complement a family vacation or embarking on a dedicated ornithological expedition in search of undiscovered avian treasures, Sarawak offers diverse experiences. Just a 30-minute drive from Kuching, you can witness a significant portion of the world's Chinese Egret population, or venture deep into the rainforest highlands of Paya Maga for a chance to spot the elusive Black Oriole.

These locations are accessible, have good accommodations and facilities nearby and are also suitable for casual birders:

- Bako Buntal Bay estuary & mangrove forest over 40 species of shorebird, including the Chinese Egret, Chinese Crested Tern and Christmas Island Frigatebird. 30 mins from Kuching.
- Bako National Park 7 distinct rainforest ecosystems in one small area more than 150 forest species including the Pin-necked Pigeon, Grey-rumped Treeswift, Common Flameback, Asian Fairy-Bluebird, Black- winged Flycatcher-Shrike and Mangrove Blue- Flycatcher. 1 hour from Kuching.
- Borneo Highlands highland forest over 200 species, including the Pygmy White-Eye, Chestnut-crested Yuhina, Blyth's Hawk-Eagle and various Hornbills. 11/2 hours from Kuching.
- Gunong Mulu National Park lowland and highland forest over 250 species, including
- the red-bearded Bee-Eater, Garnet Pitta, Rufous Bellied Eagle, all 8 Hornbills found in Borneo and many endemics. Canopy Walkway and 30m Observation Tower. 45 minutes flight from Miri.
- Kubah National Park lowland forest around 100 species, including the Bornean Blue-Flycatcher, Rufous-collared Kingfisher, Rusty-breasted Cuckoo, Chestnut-naped Forktail and the stunning Blue-banded Pitta. 45 minutes from Kuching.
- Lambir Hills National Park lowland forest around 240 species, including the Olive-backed Woodpecker, Orange-bellied Flowerpecker, Red-eyed Bulbul, Great Argus Pheasant and the delightful Fluffy- backed Tit-Babbler. 40 minutes from Miri.
- Similajau National Park lowland forest, cliffs & beach over 180 species, including Bornean Wren Babbler, Yellow-rumped Flowerpecker, Wallace's



Hawk Eagle, Short-toed Coucal, Buffy Fish-Owl, Blue-throated Bee-eater, Diard's and Scarlet-rumped Trogons. 40 minutes from Bintulu.

In Search of Wild Orangutans

The region encompassing Batang Ai National Park in Sarawak boasts one of the world's highest concentrations of wild orangutans. Situated just upriver from Batang Ai Hydro Lake, it provides excellent opportunities for observing these remarkable creatures in their natural habitat. Collaborating with local operator Borneo Adventure, the Iban communities in Ulu Ai offer a range of treks along the park's periphery, where the likelihood of encountering wild orangutans is greatest (though no guarantees can be made), and signs of their presence, such as both aged and fresh nests, are almost invariably encountered. Trekkers should possess a reasonable level of fitness and are encouraged to contribute to conservation efforts by documenting sightings and nest locations using portable GPS devices.



Diving and beaches

Diving in Sarawak

The Miri-Sibuti Coral Reefs National Park in Northeast Sarawak is rapidly gaining recognition as a top-tier diving destination, thanks to its wealth of pristine patch reefs boasting excellent visibility ranging from 10 to 30 meters. These reefs are adorned with a rich tapestry of hard and soft corals, along with a profusion of gorgonians, seawhips, anemones, sponges, and crinoids. The underwater world here teems with an array of reef species, including angelfish, butterflyfish, fusiliers, groupers, stingrays, triggerfish, parrot fish, and wrasses.

This marine wonderland boasts outstanding biodiversity and accessibility, ranking among the best in the region, featuring an impressive population of over 100 nudibranch species. Additionally, two relatively safe wreck dive sites are available, and encounters with majestic whale sharks in open waters are a common occurrence.



With approximately 40 dive sites situated in close proximity to the City of Miri, diving is both hassle-free and convenient, affording ample time to explore the city and its surroundings. Miri's extensive history as a hub for commercial divers involved in oil exploration and production ensures that divers can expect the highest standards of safety, training, guidance, and equipment, along with specialized dive medical facilities located right within the city.

In addition to Miri, Kuching also presents captivating diving opportunities, encompassing reef dives around the islands of the Talang Satang National Park and the exploration of World War II historical wrecks in the deeper waters off Santubong.

Damai Beach and The Santunbong Peninsula

Damai Beach stands as Sarawak's premier beach resort area and serves as an ideal launching point for exploring the wonders of Southwest Sarawak. Nestled on the Santubong Peninsula, with the commanding presence of Mount Santubong looming over the sea, Damai boasts a diverse range of attractions suitable for guests of all ages. These include serene fishing villages, untouched jungles, exquisite seafood restaurants, an Arnold Palmer-designed golf course, a world-renowned "living museum," and a variety of beachfront resort hotels, eco-friendly lodges, and guesthouses.

For those seeking unforgettable experiences, there are numerous tours and excursions to embark upon. These adventures encompass jungle treks leading to the summit of Mount Santubong, captivating Irrawaddy dolphin watching tours, scenic river cruises with wildlife sightings, and birdwatching expeditions at Buntal, one of Malaysia's primary hubs for migratory birds. In the horizon, you'll spot two small islands – Pulau Satang Besar and Pulau Satang Kecil – integral parts of the Talang-Satang National Park, a vital sanctuary for sea turtle conservation.

Sarawak also offers several more rustic beach destinations that beckon adventurous travellers. Sampadi, Lundu, and Sematan, along the western coastline of Kuching, feature pristine white sand beaches and accommodations in cozy chalet resorts and charming village homestays. Up north, Bintulu and Miri offer city beaches that captivate with their beauty, and further south from Miri, you'll discover a fine selection of beaches, complete with modest lodges and homestay options. The most secluded coastal gems can be found within Sarawak's National Parks, notably Bako, Tanjung Datu, and Similajau, promising tranquillity and a deep connection with nature.







Pure culture: festivals and events in Sarawak

Malaysia's rich cultural diversity fosters a vast array of traditions, rituals, and celebrations. Throughout the year, travellers have the opportunity to engage in vibrant festivals and events, immersing themselves in the multifaceted culture of this multiethnic nation.

The Malaysian event calendar kicks off with the eagerly anticipated **Chinese New Year** in January. This significant celebration, observed by Chinese communities



worldwide, heralds the commencement of the new lunar calendar year, emphasizing the importance of family bonds. Festive preparations typically commence a month in advance, involving the acquisition of decorations, new attire, and special foods. Spring cleaning is a customary prelude, and households are adorned with paper scrolls bearing heartfelt wishes.

Rainforest World Music Festival (RWMF), which began in 1997, has grown into one of Asia's top music festivals, drawing over 20,000 attendees on average. This three-day event in Kuching's Sarawak Cultural Village showcases diverse music, offering workshops, cultural displays, a craft bazaar, food stalls, and headline performances. The festival features a wide range of acts, from traditional to contemporary world music, with artists from Sarawak, Malaysia, and around the world. Over 350 local and international acts have graced its stages, earning it prestigious awards and recognition, including being named one of the World's Top 25 International Festivals by Songlines magazine from 2010 to 2015. RWMF usually takes place in June. For more information: https://rwmf.net/

Jazz Festival- The Sarawak Tourism Board orchestrates the Borneo Jazz Festival, an event staged in Miri, the second-largest city in Sarawak. Since its inception in 2005, Borneo Jazz has consistently drawn a formidable international roster of musicians, with a primary focus on mainstream jazz while also incorporating elements of blues, funk, and fusion music. Notable artists gracing the festival's stage have included luminaries like Maria Muldaur, John Hammond, Jump4Joy, Hazmat Modine, Schalk Joubert, and the New Cool Collective. This festival is an annual affair that unfolds in Miri. Borneo Jazz Festival usually takes place in July. For more information: https://jazzborneo.com/

Gawai Dayak Festival, observed annually on June 1st and 2nd, is a cherished festival among the Dayak communities of Sarawak. It goes far beyond being a mere display of indigenous culture for tourists; it is a heartfelt celebration that resonates in every village and longhouse. Urban Dayaks make their way back home to partake in the festivities, creating a backdrop of joy and genuine enthusiasm. During this time, weddings are solemnized, melodious songs fill the air, toasts are raised, and families reunite with warmth. In the spirit of the grand Malaysian open house tradition, visitors are warmly embraced. The festival commences on the evening of May 31st with traditional music and rituals aimed at warding off the negative influences of greed, ensuring the merriment remains untainted. The festival leader, known as Tua Gawai, offers a chicken as a token of gratitude for a bountiful harvest. This ritual is followed by a communal dinner and an informal gathering marked by spirited dancing, singing, and revelry. This festive spirit carries on for the subsequent two days, and perhaps even longer, as long as the rice wine supply remains abundant. For those who relish exuberant celebrations.
