
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Agria offered an unforgettable display of elite sport at the Falsterbo Horse Show, now a proud stop on the prestigious Rolex Series. With 50 of the world's best riders on the start list and and a nation passionately cheering for its heroes. From the very first round, the course set by Frank Rothenberger (GER), with Fredrik Malm (SWE) and Philipp **Schwender (GER)**, demanded complete focus. With 14 obstacles and 17 efforts, the challenge was clear — and

the pressure, immediate. Argentina's José María Larocca, first to go, picked up 8 faults, highlighting the course's complexity. Then came a wave of brilliance, second to go: Sanne Thijssen (NED) with Con Quidam RB posted the first clear in a sharp

83.83s, setting the pace. Soon after, Max Kühner (AUT) and Eic Daloubet went clear in 86.91s, followed by Pius

Schwizer (SUI) and Jason R in 86.86s. Simon Crippen (GBR) and Handsome kept the clear rounds coming in 87.87s, before **Trevor Breen (IRL)** raised the stakes, flying through in 82.99s to take the early lead. The crowd erupted when Amanda Eriksson became the first Swede to go clear with Folsom. But the grandstands truly exploded for national icons Rolf-Göran Bengtsson and Henrik von Eckermann. The latter, paired with Minute Man, delivered a flawless round in 83.90s, igniting thunderous cheers — especially as this pair had already won Thursday's opening qualifier. Additional faultless rounds followed: Matias Larocca

(ARG) with Patron van de Dweerhoeve (84.30s), Pedro Junqueira Muylaert (BRA) with Quax 76 (85.32s), and Steve Guerdat (SUI) with Dynamix de Belheme, the Paris 2024 Olympic silver medallists, in a strong 83.75s. Then came the standout round of the day: Karl Cook (USA) and his phenomenal Caracole de la **Roque** — winners of the Rolex Grand Prix of Rome 2024 — who soared into the lead with a blazing 77.69s. Rounding out the clear rounds were Peder Fredricson (SWE) on Alcapone des Carmille (81.61s), Andreas Schou (DEN) on Darc de Lux (84.84s), and a superb effort from Malin Baryard-Johnsson (SWE) and H&M

Indiana, who thrilled the home crowd with a lightning-fast clear in 80.18s. Fourteen riders produced faultless rounds, but only 13 could return — **Amanda Eriksson**, just outside the time cut, was heartbreakingly eliminated. The final phase promised fireworks — and delivered. **Simon Crippen** opened the second round but collected 4 faults, before Max Kühner laid down the first double clear in 49.40s. Andreas Schou followed, tightening every turn to stop the clock in a bold 47.03s. **Matias Larocca** rode with purpose and style, finishing clear in 50.30s. Then **Sanne Thijssen**, full of confidence, stormed the arena and produced an electrifying round in 43.74s — fast, fluid, fearless. It looked unbeatable. But champions don't fold easily: Steve Guerdat came close in 44.20s, and Malin Baryard-Johnsson, under intense pressure from her home supporters, delivered yet another superb clear in 45.64s, briefly climbing to third.

and a worthy addition to his growing list of international successes. As the dust settled on one of the most dramatic Rolex Grand Prix in recent memory, emotions ran high, and reflections from the riders revealed just how much this moment meant.

All eyes turned to the final rider: Karl Cook. Cool-headed and razor-sharp, he and Caracole de la **Roque** executed the perfect round — tight, efficient, and fast. The clock stopped at **43.28 seconds**, just enough to clinch victory in one of the most thrilling Rolex Grand Prix finishes to date. A triumph of calm under pressure,

Steve Guerdat, who claimed third place aboard Dynamix de Belheme, spoke with heartfelt satisfaction after his performance: "I'm very, very happy today. Of course, sometimes you feel disappointed to not win — but today I'm proud of this

third place. I gave my mare a great ride, and she was phenomenal in both rounds. We're still missing just a bit of speed, but it was definitely our best second round together. It gives me confidence for the future, and that's a big

win in itself." A longtime admirer of Falsterbo, Guerdat also praised the evolution of the event and the support it receives: "This is one of my absolute favourite shows. The crowd is unbelievable — they bring so much joy and energy. There's no better place to do what we love. And now that Rolex is involved, I'm confident this show will only continue to grow. It's what our sport needs."

Sanne Thijssen, who finished second with a brilliant double clear aboard Con Quidam RB, expressed mixed

And then there was the winner — Karl Cook, who delivered a masterclass aboard Caracole de la Roque to take the title. The American rider remained humble in victory, acknowledging the energy that surrounded him and the

importance of crowd support: "The crowd here is a gift to the sport. They love horses, they understand the competition, and they bring so much passion. It makes you ride better."

Cook explained the strategy behind his victory: "Thankfully, Caracole was very fast in the first round, so I didn't need to take risks. I could ride our own pace and see what others did in the second round. I knew the six strides after the double would be tricky for us because of
